


A Year of Impacts

The Tribal Solar Accelerator Fund is a program designed to support the development and deployment of solar energy projects in Native American communities. This innovative program, part of GRID Alternatives, is focused on promoting renewable energy sources, reducing greenhouse gas emissions, and increasing energy independence in Native American communities.

In 2022, the TSAF funded 27 tribal grantees and supported 17 tribal individuals who are strengthening the renewable energy capacity in their tribal communities to lead the way to an energy resilient future.

In 2022, we met three key objectives:


- Increased access to philanthropic funding for tribal communities to progress toward their renewable energy goals;
